They led groups all over the country and also hosted groups during the national carnival celebration every year. At the same time, she was copy editor of an English language travel magazine called Magic Haiti which was subsidized by Haiti's Ministry of Tourism. The magazine featured caves, waterfalls, beaches, restaurants, hotels, artisans, musicians and more. Wanting to be more intentional about what she was doing, she left Haiti to grow her knowledge with an MS in tourism management from Clemson University. She focused on community-based tourism. Then Port au Prince became less safe and she decided to stay with her son in the States. She can't wait to share some of her favorite spots in Haiti. You can bet Rick Steves doesn't know about these!

Angela says: "We'll start with a tour of the top 5 beaches in Haiti, then hit up the MUPANAH (which is a museum/mausoleum in the heart of Port-au-Prince), and end with the Citadelle Laferriere (UNESCO World Heritage Site). I'll make the Zoom's interactive with polls and we'll start with an ice breaker that includes introductions. We can see how else to make it interactive once we see who we've got signed up."

Fiction Circle (Edwidge Danticat) Thursday evenings 7:30-9 EST; July 25, August 8, August 22 Carol Hawke

Carole Hawke is a longtime supporter of Beyond Borders. She's a high school teacher living in Detroit, Michigan and who's been involved in faith-based and youth work in her beautiful city. Carol is also the proud single parent of three children who spent portions of their youth in foster care before being adopted as teens. Now adults, their compassion for others in difficult circumstances has been a source of beauty and challenge for Carol.

Carol says: "Aspects of my own biography attract me to Beyond Borders and to the literature of Haitian American author Edwidge Danticat. I have been inspired by Beyond Borders' commitment to working creatively with neighbors at the grassroots level in vulnerable communities to promote wholeness of life for other neighbors. And the literature of Edwidge Danticat consistently centers characters who reach out in love– to family, to others– in spite of the deep challenges and wounds in their own lives. My thought for the book group is that it would convene 3 times for 90 minutes each, each time 2-3 weeks apart. In this way, it is not an overwhelming commitment."

"There are several good options for discussion which we could choose from. Danticat's most recent Everything Inside is a collection of 8 short stories set mostly in Haiti and the US. Her beautiful memoir, Brother, I'm Dying is a slightly longer account of her relationship with her uncle who raised her in Haiti for several years and her father who sent for her to join the family in New York. While the characters are the focus, the backdrop is the events in Haiti and the US which drive the decisions thrust upon the family. (Disclaimer: You may cry the whole way through.) Clare of the Sea Light also sounds good (Another disclaimer: I haven't read it yet!) and touches on many themes which Beyond Borders seeks to address in the communities in which it works— the restavek system, gendered violence, and environmental impact."

Teacher Consultant Circle

Jeff was a member of Beyond Borders' first Board of Directors thirty years ago, and has just returned, joyfully, to BB board service. Jeff says: "In our school district in Pennsylvania, parents of 17,000 students sometimes express a desire to introduce their children to the world's great need, and to educate their hearts. In my own experiments connecting curriculum to community service, I've seen my pupils grow and change, receiving more then they give. I'm eager to know about ideas that teacher colleagues might have about connecting our teacher-work to Beyond Borders."
