

Racism and Water

Did You Know...?

- Unequal water access is one of the systemic injustices that oppress people of color. <u>Living</u>
 <u>without water and sanitation</u> access makes it difficult to stay healthy, earn a living, go to school,
 <u>find stable and adequate housing</u>, and care for a family.
- In the United States and Canada, "race is still the strongest determinant" when it comes to water access.
 - Women of color most often shoulder the burden of ensuring clean water for their families, an <u>arduous and time-consuming task</u>, especially when concerned for at-risk family members, such as the elderly, children, and the infirm.
- Canada is one of the most <u>water-rich countries</u> in the world, yet "the water supplied to many First Nations communities on reserves is contaminated, hard to access, or at risk due to faulty treatment systems."
 - o In some communities, water advisories warning of contaminated water have been in place for more than 20 years.
 - From 2004-2014, two-thirds of First Nations peoples lived under a water advisory.
- In the U.S. and Puerto Rico, more than <u>two million people</u> lack basic indoor plumbing and sanitation.
 - Native American households are <u>19 times more likely</u> than white households to lack indoor plumbing. African American and Latinx households are nearly twice as likely.
- Discrimination in water infrastructure development initiatives and lack of federal funding have compounded water access challenges in communities of color.
