

In this Stewardship Report, we present how that has happened by hearing from alums of schools where we have served and from donors. Traditional education has long been a focus of our ministry and

still is at Notre Dame of Maryland University; our high schools: Academy of Holy Angels, Institute of Notre Dame and Notre Dame Preparatory School; and our two co-sponsored middle schools: Mother Seton and Sisters Academies. In the context of academic excellence and the SSND charism for unity, students participate not only in the rigors of a strong curriculum, but in the rigors of the curriculum of life.

As Blessed Theresa, our foundress, and Mother Caroline did in their time, we have been attentive to the needs of our time. Thus, we have extended our educational efforts to those who have not had the opportunity to complete their education and need to get GED or job training and to women who are immigrants and need to learn English as well as to youngsters who need more assistance with their studies. It is education that transforms by opening the doors to possibilities for each woman or young person to reach her potential and to assist her world community in becoming a better place for all.

Our sisters never retire for we are always called to be about God's mission. The report highlights ways our sisters continue ministering to others in what is usually called 'retirement'. Is that not true of you also? I imagine that those of you who are 'retired' from your professional responsibilities have not retired from being about God's mission.

## Transforming the world

Blessed Theresa Gerhardinger, foundress of the School Sisters of Notre Dame, had a special commitment to women, children and persons who are poor. She believed women to be the heart of the family and society, and the education of women could transform the world.

### Commitment

For more than 180 years, the School Sisters of Notre Dame have remained committed to the primary, secondary and post-secondary education of girls and women. Here in the Atlantic-Midwest Province, SSNDs founded the Institute of Notre Dame, the SSND's first school in America the Notre Dame of Maryland University, the first Catholic college for women in the US to award the four-year baccalaureate degree. Numerous more schools have been founded and have flourished since that time.

Pre-school through post-graduate, women and children, rich or poor, the SSND-based education provides one that is defined by stellar academics, lifelong guiding values, the belief in oneness proclaimed by Jesus Christ and the unshakable confidence that the world can be transformed through education. 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### Career & Technical Education reaching one's potential

The SSND way is to meet every child and adult where they are and to guide them as individuals to achieve their fullest potential, wherever it takes them.

Through career and technical education outreach centers, women are offered learning paths to help them develop practical, relevant and marketable skills that enable them to be more employable.

Women can prepare for high school equivalency exams, learn English, receive tutoring and gain basic computer, finance and life skills. Low-income women and children regardless of race, religion or ethnic background can turn to these tuition-free opportunities and reach the fullness of their individual potential.

Pre-school, after-school and summer programs enrich children socially and academically while allowing mothers to focus on gaining necessary skills that will lead to security for themselves and their families. Children who are having problems in school receive reading, math, technology and language tutoring. This intervention provides remediation and encouragement for children who might otherwise fall through the cracks.

These career and technical education outreach centers are places where individuals can turn from hopelessness to hopefulness, dependence to independence, joblessness to employment. Where they can move from homelessness to a place they can call their own. And in the process, they gain the self-esteem and courage to begin turning dreams into reality.

## Lifelong Vinistry A divine service


Throughout their lives, School Sisters embody the mission to proclaim the good news and direct their entire lives toward the oneness for which Jesus Christ was sent.

When their time comes to transition to retirement or post-retirement often in their 70s, 80s and beyond—they remain engaged. They continue to teach by example.

They tutor children and women, prepare food for the homeless, crochet clothing for impoverished infants, and create handmade items to be sold in support of a ministry. They give a willing hand to those among them who are less able or are ailing. They help other sisters attend medical appointments; they are present at sickbeds.

For many, their ministry extends beyond life. In 1986 in what would become a landmark study, 678 School Sisters of Notre Dame aged over 75 years agreed to participate in a longitudinal study of aging and Alzheimer's disease. It is an endeavor that culminates post mortem with learnings that will extend far into the future. The study continues today with the youngest member nearly 99 years old and enjoying excellent health and a vibrant life in New England.

School Sisters exemplify throughout life the complimentary beliefs the education of women can transform the world and learning is lifelong.


