Haiti Collaboration

SSND and **Beyond Borders** have a partnership in service of the people of Haiti. The collaboration empowers Haitians in efforts to increase access to quality primary education, promote economic justice and sustainable livelihoods, and stop the practice of restavèk, or child domestic servitude. SSND trains teachers in Haiti and provides educational materials through Notre Dame of Maryland University, participates on Beyond Borders' board, and supports a prayer ministry for the Haitian people.

Justice for <u>Immigrants</u>

We live in a time of unprecedented, forced migration and displacement, which puts vulnerable migrants and refugees in the path of potential exploitation, such as human trafficking. SSND is committed to supporting immigrants through our ministries and by educating and advocating for just immigration laws. With immigration a part of our own history, we promote awareness of the important contributions that immigrants make to societies.

End Human **Trafficking**

There are an estimated 50 million human trafficking sex and labor victims around the world. We address the plight of modern slavery by raising our consciousness, advocating and engaging in activities to help those affected by this crime. Our work is guided by the primary principle of Catholic Social Teaching - the life and dignity of the human person. We recognize the interrelated economic, social, racial, environmental, etc., root causes of human trafficking and seek to understand our contribution to systems that oppress others.
