## Associates Reflect on *Love Gives Everything* by Suzy Blackburn

Associate Area Coordinators from across the province gathered in Wilton, June 10-13, to explore the future of the Associate Relationship through the lens of *Love Gives Everything*, deepening their understanding of the Directional Statement that had been introduced to them the previous year.

Sister Sharon Kanis, Provincial Councilor, gave the keynote presentation "Interculturality: The Oneness for Which Jesus Christ Was Sent." She invited associates to reflect on who is "the other" for them, and what it would take to "adjust their lens" as associate leaders. Her presentation and the reflection and conversation it prompted provided the perfect backdrop for the rest of the meeting.

"We are in a Pentecost moment for associates," Sister Linda Stilling announced the following day as she and Associate Mary Anne O'Donnell led a conversation on "Inviting and Nourishing the Associate Relationship." How can associates reflect the openness and inclusivity necessary to attract more diverse members and provide a welcoming experience to them?

These and other questions surfaced many times throughout the gathering as the Area Coordinators examined the results of the recent associate survey, shared their responses to the new pre-associate formation materials, and updated each other on happenings in local areas.

Highlights of the three-day meeting included a video presentation by Sister Charmaine Krohe on "Deepening our Understanding of *Love Gives Everything*." One of the participants noted that "To hear Sister Charmaine say that associates are indispensable collaborators was very powerful."

Walking the Talk of *Love Gives Everything* challenged those present to look at "God's amazing universe" and no longer think of social justice issues as separate from ecology.

On the final morning of their meeting, the associate leaders reflected on all they had heard and shared, and expressed hope "that we keep growing in energy and passion for Mother Theresa's vision" as they continued to live *Love Gives Everything*.


## Chicago Associates Enjoy a Picnic in the Country

## Being Peace: A Presentation by Mary Gunning

## The SSND/Associate Relationship: Then and Now by Rosemarie Craven



On a Saturday morning in March 2019, twelve School Sisters of Notre Dame, twelve SSND Associates, and ten “interested” women gathered at NDC in Waterdown, to share each others company, and to learn and enjoy hearing about the joys and struggles that shaped the spirit of a valiant foundress.

School Sisters of Notre Dame — Louise Vanderploeg, Delia Calis, Gloria Seifried and Joyce Lorentz — “brought to life”, by reading aloud, several chronologic excerpts from Foundress Mother Theresa of Jesus Gerhardinger’s letters.

These historical letters written to church officials, bishops, clergy, royals, and her own “Armen Schule Schwestern” (Poor School Sisters, as the SSND were named in the early to mid 1800’s), made evident the constant and seemingly insurmountable challenges that faced her at every turn of the journey ....the journey to provide and make accessible the education (an education grounded in her own Gospel values of poverty, love, trust, prayer and mission) to young girls — not only the urbanized and wealthy, but also, the poor and marginalized of rural society.

Reading these letters proved Blessed Theresa to be a woman of vision, courage, wisdom, prudence, and enduring faith — always trusting that God’s Will would prevail — even in the face of constant threat and RISK from political, cultural, and sociological influences - each and all of which were battling for power and the control over the education supplied by “Die Armen Schule Schwestern” (SSND).

Then, after happily celebrating Eucharist, everyone (35+ in number), continued sharing lively conversations in the NDC dining room, and making new friends.

After lunch, Sister Harriet Schnurr led the attendees on a chronologic and descriptive path of the “emerging” and ensuing growth, of this special relationship between Sisters and interested, faith-filled lay persons.

Some personal testimonials of Associates and Sisters who had served on Team from the early 1980’s to 2013, in addition to the review of the interesting results tabulated from our very recent AM Associates Survey, sparked further interest and questions.

These gathered knew that our Associates in western Canada were “with them in spirit” every time they glanced at the table filled with radiantly beautiful prayer shawls, made by loving hands, for the Sisters on NDC’s 3<sup>rd</sup> floor.

All in all — the day was a perfect recipe for a “soul-searching” and “grace – filled” day !!!




## Ontario, Associates Re-Covenant
