Meet Our New Provincial Council

he Provincial Leader is the major superior of the province. She is assisted by her Councilors, and together they form the Provincial Council, itself a community of faith." (You Are Sent, GD66)



ur in-person provincial election was scheduled for March 2020 in Chicago. Although the pandemic was just beginning, it was decided that it was too dangerous to bring a majority of our Sisters together in one place because of COVID-19. Instead, the previous Council agreed to stay on until an Election Assembly — which our Constitution You Are Sent proclaims has to be held in-person — could be rescheduled. The thought was their extended term might last six months. However, after gathering in person was still not deemed safe after a year, the congregation appealed to CICLSAL (Congregation for Institutes of Consecrated Life and Societies of Apostolic Life) to instead do virtual elections or have the General Council in Rome appoint a leadership team. Since the latter option could happen in a more timely manner, the General Council — based on recommendations from the Sisters in the province — appointed the following Sisters, who were installed as the new Atlantic-Midwest Provincial Council on December 8.

Sister Charmaine Krohe

Provincial Leader Sister Charmaine Krohe has been reappointed to that position, which she has held since 2016. During that time, she has overseen the relocation of many of the Sisters in the province before the closing and potential sale of multiple properties that the province currently owns, including two nursing centers in Baltimore and Connecticut, a large residence for Sisters in Wilton, Connecticut, and Notre Dame Convent in Waterdown, Ontario Canada, where the Sisters will lease back part of the property as a residence, while the rest will be used for an international school. Sister Charmaine had previously served as President of Mother Seton Academy, and for 34 years she lived and served the African-American community at St. Ambrose Parish in Northwest Baltimore as teacher, pastoral associate, hospital chaplain, and founder of the St. Ambrose Outreach Center.

Sister Mary Roy Weiss

Sister Mary Roy Weiss has been appointed Provincial Councilor and Vicar. She has been a religion teacher and campus minister at Notre Dame Preparatory School in Towson, MD since 2017. Although much of her career has been spent as an educator in religion and music, and as a music therapist in school settings, Sister Mary Roy has also worked in Vocation Ministry and as a Province Minister of Liturgy and Music.

Sister Paula Nukehart

Sister Paula Dukehart has been appointed as a Provincial Councilor. She previously served in the same role from 2008–2016 (and was Vicar from 2012–2016). Sister Paula started out as a teacher and later moved into pastoral counseling, Vocation and Formation ministry, and hospice chaplaincy. Most recently she had been Assistant Local Leader for the Villa Assumpta and Stella Maris communities of Sisters in Baltimore.

Sister Mary Fitzgerald

Sister Mary Fitzgerald has been appointed a member of the Provincial Council for the first time. Sister Mary has spent her career working in education from the grade school to university levels. On and off for 27 years, she worked at the Institute of Notre Dame in Baltimore, the first SSND school in the United States, where she was teacher, Vice-Principal, Principal and President throughout her time there. Since 2007 she has been at Notre Dame of Maryland University, which was also founded by the SSNDs as the first Catholic college for women in the U.S. Sister Mary was an Associate Professor.

Sister Mancy Gilchriest

Sister Nancy Gilchriest has also been appointed as a Provincial Councilor for the first time. She taught high school in Boston, MA and Rochester and Brooklyn, NY early in her career and then progressed into higher education. After teaching at Notre Dame of Maryland University for five years, she had been an Associate Professor and Chair of the Education Department at St. Joseph's College in Brooklyn, NY since 2006. She had also served as Director of the North America Vocation Team since 2016.

Sister Margaret Malone

Sister Margaret Malone has been appointed as a Provincial Councilor for the first time, although she previously served in leadership as District Councilor in the District of Africa, which would go on to become the Province of Africa in 2011. Sister Margaret taught elementary and junior high grades in Maryland, Florida, North Carolina, and South Carolina throughout her early years as a Sister, before answering the call to go to Africa in 1994. She worked as a teacher, principal, and administrator in schools in Nigeria, Kenya, and South Sudan until 2019, when she returned to Baltimore.

Women of Impact Grateful Friends of SSND Share How the Sisters Touched Their Lives



Part of their mandate was the call to teach Summer Bible Camp and "walk with" the people, encouraging them to be leaders in their own faith culture and community. Every year a multidenominational group of Christians from Canada and the United States volunteer to travel to the North to do this.

During all my trips North, I secretly hoped that I would be assigned to

have been an Associate of the School Sisters of Notre Dame for the past 25 years, and what a journey it has been! In 2001, I was asked by the leadership team to keep Sister Joan Liss company for the month of February in Fort Resolution on the eastern coast of Great Slave Lake in the Northwest Territories of Canada. Later, Sister Joan phoned and asked me if I would be on the Board of On Eagles Wings (OEW), a non-profit organization that ministers to the people of the North.

verything I ever learned, I learned from SSNDs," is my mantra. What it really means is that I learned HOW to learn from SSNDs — from Sisters Alaquo and Louis Bertand at Immaculate Conception School in Malden, MA; Sisters Andrew, Cuthbert, DeLourdes, Dorothy, Ambrosine and Mother Vitalia at Holy Name School in Providence, RI; and Sisters Frances Therese, Regina, Cecelia, Helene (pictured), Girard, Ignatius, another Louis Bertrand and my pal Sister Aidan, who ran the cafeteria at the Academy of the Holy Angels in Ft. Lee, NJ. As the Nelson family moved from state to state, only one criteria mattered: was there an SSND school nearby? My mother and all her siblings treasured their education at Immaculate Conception School in Malden, which led many of them to college, a rarity in the early 1900s. My life has been blessed by experiencing travel to Chile and Peru visiting Sister Helenann Nelson, who has spent most of her life in mission. Her presence in my life has truly been a blessing.

Claire Nelson Dale, AHA 1948 Cherry Hill, New Jersey y mother graduated from Holy Angels in 1942 and then from College of Notre Dame (now Notre Dame of Maryland University) in 1946. She was close to many of the Sisters, but especially Sister
