Easter Comes in Many Ways...

Since the last issue, we not only celebrated Easter but lived through an entire Easter Season. Scripture recounts for us Jesus' many appearances to people he was close to during his lifetime. We heard accounts of Jesus appearing first to Mary Magdalene at the tomb, then to the other women as they return from the tomb, to Simon Peter, to the disciples on the road to Emmaus, and later the disciples in the upper room - first without, then with Thomas, to the seven disciples at work, fishing at the Sea of Tiberius. He appeared to the 11 disciples at an appointed place on a mountain in Galilee, where Jesus gives the "Great Commission". Jesus appeared to 500 brethren at once and was seen by his brother James. He was seen ascending into Heaven by the apostles and others, but not before instructing them to wait for the baptism of the Holy Spirit and the receipt of his power. And lastly, he appeared to Saul on the

road to Damascus. In all instances, the disciples experienced Christ no longer dead but risen, which led to a deepening of their belief in him and the building of the Christian community.

Reflecting on the post-resurrection experiences, I cannot help but draw parallels to the General Council's visit to our province in April. While their visit was not exactly aligned with the time after Easter, they 'appeared' (although not unannounced like Jesus) at our Provincial offices, Sisters' residences and our sponsored and co-sponsored ministries. They shared their love, joy and hope, they listened, encouraged, admired, affirmed. They shared faith and assured us of their presence and prayer, and in the spirit of *You Are Sent* and the Directional Statement *Love Gives Everything*, they affirmed the

call each one of us has, 'to make one' in our times, to be and build community in its many forms.

Looking back and contemplating both the General Council's visit to you and your ministry and/or Sisters' residence, and the disciples' post-resurrection experiences, can you make a connection? Is there anything revealed to you? Is something being moved inside you? What might be asked of you?

mission and in vision as lived out in the unfolding SSND charism through us, the living community.



the moment Sister Martina arrived on the scene.

Her quiet, respectful, and warm personality immediately made her "one of us". Meeting one-on-one with some of Corazón's tutors and ESL learners, Sister shared with each her own struggles learning the English language. Her advice to each learner was, "Practice, practice, practice – that's the most important thing." And to the volunteer tutors, "Thank you, thank you, thank you". Learners felt encouraged by Sister's visit, especially by her empathy. Some comments after the visit captured the impact of the visit:


SSND Educational Center – Woodhaven, NY


I had only been the Executive Director for a little over a month when a call came in from Sr. Miriam Patrick, informing me that

she and Sr. Martina Radež would be coming for a visit. I immediately agreed to accommodate their visit. I never thought coming to work on a Sunday would be such a joy.

Sr. Martina seemed a little reserved. She had a pleasant smile and appeared to be a woman of few words. Well, that was not necessarily the case. Sr. Martina was quite the conversationalist, super supportive, and very open-minded. It was great being able to have real conversation about some of the realities women from SisterHouse encounter. We discussed the plague of fentanyl being added to drugs, the affect it

had on women and the best way to intervene and help our women in their recovery process.

As we toured the house, we talked about how beautiful the convent was and how it heightened the spiritual element of the women's recovery. I also shared my hopes and vision for SisterHouse. A conversation I had with Sister Miriam Patrick and Sr. Martina helped give me the confidence needed to make a proposal to our Board of Directors on some major changes that are now in place. Thank you, Sr. Martina, for being a great sounding board and supportive player!
