

The lockdown in response to the pandemic shook the Academy of the Holy Angels (AHA) community. Spring was the time of year that the senior retreat was offered, a time for the seniors to get together to reflect on their year and share their hopes for the future. However, the campus ministry team had to think of another way to offer the retreat – they turned to a virtual gathering. Adjusting to a new norm, the team, along with the seniors, wanted to send a message of hope. One highlight of the senior retreat is affirmations, which are shared on poster boards, lifting up hopes and acknowledgments of each individual. *You are Sent* reminds us, “We are called and sent to deepen communion with God and among people wherever we are – in every place, in every time, in every situa-

tion,” (C 9). A mission leader is one who sees opportunity in every situation. Mission Leaders Foster the Common Good

The pandemic posed new challenges, forcing Caroline House to move towards online education. The teachers were not 100% confident they could pull off online teaching with such a small window for preparation. Helen Ramos, our program manager, saw otherwise. Normally, we have 70 students, but given the pandemic, 30 students were currently enrolled. These women were hungry for learning. In my four years here, I have come to know how close the women

are with one another in this community. Getting to know them, they are comfortable letting you know the needs within the community. For instance, one woman's husband was out of work while some families faced difficulty paying for rent and food. With these challenges, the Caroline House community knew what was coming down the pipeline.

We recently hired a grant writer and focused our efforts on raising resiliency funds. All of sudden, money started coming in. We were able to raise \$20,000! With these funds, we helped at least twenty families, pro-

viding financial assistance to cover utilities while also providing gift cards to aid them in purchasing non-perishable food items and medication. The women gave back what they did not need, lifting up the value of the common good for the Caroline House community. In my thirty years of being in social services, I have not seen this level of honesty among people, understanding basic needs.

This takes me back to the pilgrimage – I feel like I'm wearing the cloak of Blessed Theresa and Mother Caroline, doing what we have to do to do what we need to do. Caroline

Mission Leaders Remember They Are Human

The adjustments that we have had to make have brought me closer to the women we serve and closer to our mission. The stay-at-home orders proved to be hard for most of them because the restrictions brought back feelings of imprisonment. Many women that come to Marian House were formerly incarcerated, so the last thing we wanted was for the sense of imprisonment to creep back during their stay here. My staff and I have made it our top priority to make Marian House feel like home.

As a leader, I think mission leadership means focusing on the humanity of our work. It is about meeting the needs of the women we serve and the staff who serve them. Being a residential program is challenging in a pandemic. Early on I went to bed thinking about the empty beds we

had at Marian House and the number of women in the community who needed them. I am so glad we were able to find a way to resume admissions and to use technology to provide supports and therapy. Now I am happy that many staff are coming in part-time. Technology is important, but it cannot replace human interaction!

Our vision compels us to unlock the potential found within our women – we want them to feel whole, safe and loved. Our women come to us so broken, they often don't believe they can be loved. They don't know what safety is. I hear some women saying, "I don't know who I am" or "I don't know how to be a friend." They don't

have a sense of their own self-worth. This program is a journey of self-discovery. It is a true honor to be a part of that journey.

There are numerous members of the Marian House community who reached out to share their love and prayers during these uncertain times. This reminds me that we cannot go at this work alone, that we have to lean on one another in order to keep the mission going.

Mission Leaders Meet the Needs of Their Community

Due to dwindling enrollments and personnel, several Catholic schools in the urban center of Baltimore closed, creating an unmet need for children who were academically capable but

economically unable to afford a Catholic school education. The six congregations working together created and sponsored Mother Seton Academy (MSA).

Since that time, MSA provided a transformative education for its students and helped them take their rightful place as citizens of their city, state and nation. Families too are engaged as the first learning community for the students and are invited to engage in service and community building activities for the students.

MSA has been blessed to have a committed, mission-driven faculty, focused on helping the students to

develop to the fullness of their potential. One example of this commitment to mission is Leah Benzing, who teaches sixth grade Language Arts. A product of SSND elementary education at Sacred Heart Highlandtown and secondary education at Institute of Notre Dame (IND), Leah is committed to building community among the students, staff, faculty and families. She is a teacher fully engaged with the students in the classroom and in their activities. Ms. Benzing is the students' number one fan at events and basketball games.

Daily leadership is provided by our principal, Dr. Gregory Sucre. His relational approach to discipline and integrated understanding of education has strengthened MSA's retention. His calm demeanor and capable skills helped prepare our staff and students for the challenges faced when the school moved to remote learning due to Covid-19. Because he and the staff had worked to develop skills for remote learning, MSA was able to respond positively to the challenges

of an unexpected closing. During the summer, the faculty continued to enhance their skills so that we can begin the fall semester with an integrated approach to virtual schooling.

Give me an open heart and listening ears to understand the challenges which face those who are marginalized, lacking the basic necessities for a dignified life.


Give me the resolve to work with others to make a new reality, so that those who suffer injustice are heard and feel the impact of our solidarity as they confront the issues in their communities.
