

The history of his life and the relationship with his mother really resonated with me. I'm a mother of two sons, so it piqued my interest. I am also a history buff, so to have this professor and scholar of St. Augustine take me back to his time of existence and share what was going on politically, spiritually and personally with him was fascinating. This was a quick account of his life, but it was dense, thought provoking and intriguing. What really captured my attention to where I was spiritually renewed was when we went into reading excerpts Augustine's *Confessions* (Book IX). Through his own words, I felt a kinship to him. I love to travel and last December I went to Rome, Italy. Now that I know about St. Augustine, I will be traveling back to Italy, but this time I'm headed to Milan.

The new insight that I gained about my leadership in a SSND's co-sponsored ministry in my school is that I want the students to know the great work of the SSNDs. I am the principal of Sisters Academy of Baltimore (SAB) where our all-girls middle school was founded by four congregations of sisters, SSND being one of them. The girls know of the SSNDs and many of them can tell you a little about them. However, I want the students to dive deeper in understanding the sacrifices that these sisters made to come to America and their early experiences in this country. It's important to know the charisms of the founding sisters and ingrain them into our curriculum. This year I'm implementing a deeper dive into the history of the SSNDs in our religion classes.

Professionally/Organizationally - Claiming the Fire Within starts with a concrete foundation of systems and procedures in place:

- it mitigates second guessing and promotes sticking to practices that have been put into place;
- in any absence (staffing), things can run as a well-oiled machine;
- it allows for one to work in a less chaotic state and accomplish more;
- it enables one to tap into the emotional and well-being of an individual, and in some instances, helps to catch and avoid meltdowns or stress related occurrences;
- it helps to navigate in a professional state and avoid being overwhelmed (centering oneself to block out noises and disruptions); and
- it allows me to voice my opinions even when they differ from others, resulting in the same end goal.

Personally - It deepens the sense of self sufficiency, not relying on others, to take a leap of faith even when the safety net is not apparent. It keeps me pressing forward knowing that a Higher Power is in control. It has deepened my faith knowing all is possible, even the things that can't be seen. It requires patience in the midst of storms; it allows for the quiet and stillness in moments of despair/doubt/and disbelief. It focuses on the health and thankfulness for what is present and those things unseen. Claiming the fire isn't about people-pleasing, or matching energy, but standing firm and trusting in self and things gained and achieved. It allows for constant self-reflection and getting outside of your comfort zone. It allows peace within and patience waiting on a word or sign from GOD in assurance that all things are aligned and in perfect order.

Volunteers come with a willingness to serve, to give back. They come with experience and expertise in their field, or a willingness to learn.

Not many come to Corazón because it is a sponsored ministry of the School Sisters of Notre Dame; yet sponsorship is at the heart of Corazón. The how and why at Corazón stem from the vision and charism of the School Sisters of Notre Dame.

No wonder then, these volunteers are invited to learn more about what it means to volunteer at an SSND sponsored ministry.

The conversation with new volunteers centers on three components of a sponsored ministry: the Doer's, the ministry, and the Congregation.

These volunteers come with their own gifts and personalities. Inviting them to reflect on their history, experiences and relationships opens them to the importance of Corazón's tagline: "When hearts connect, lives are changed." During this "Who am I" time they are asked to complete seven to ten "I am statements, i.e. wife, daughter, Italian, Catholic, golfer, etc. and share how these relationships have shaped them into the persons they bring to Corazón today. Sharing some "I am" statements help them to know one another.

A video on Mission, prepared by the Office of Mission Formation of the School Sisters of Notre Dame, reminds the participants of their own baptismal call to service and how that call is enriched and expanded through partnership with SSND. In this video they also learn the beginnings of the School Sisters of Notre Dame and how the dream of educating young girls, who subsequently could transform society, has changed countless lives over one hundred ninety years.

Throughout the session, references are made to the ministry at Corazón, the enablement of persons to reach the fullness of their potential through the ESL and Youth programs. "Impelled by the mission of Jesus, enriched by the charism of the School Sisters of Notre Dame" Corazón volunteers continue to show forth God's abundant love by their very being. Very Important People, indeed!
